STATEMENT OF :-

GARALLI Eduardo, Male. 29 Via Spinello, Aged 31 years. Arezzo.

Who saith,

I am an American citizen. I was born in HEREFFORD, CONNETICUT, USA, on 7th. July 1913 and lived in AMERICA until 1932, when I returned to ITALY to study in FLORENCE.

I both read and write English and am employed as an interpreter for FFSO Allied Military Government, AREZZO.

I joined the RAGGRUFFAMENTO "AMIATA" Brigade of partisans on 3rd February 1944 until 20th. July 1944, and acted as Liason Officer between the National Committee of Liberation and my partisan brigade.

About 0700 hours on Thursday, 29th. June 1944, I was in bed with my wife Elia and my dauther. Maria Louise, aged two years, at the house of CHIATTI Stefano, near CORNEA.

We were awakened by the sound of automatic small arms fire which came from the direction of CIVITRILA which is about one and a half kilometres away.

I immediately got out of bed with both my wife and baby and went outside my house where I learned from my neighbours that SS troops had entered CIVITELLA and were killing the inhabitants. With other civilians of CORNEA we went to a well hidden valley about 500 yards away and hid. In all there were about twenty civilians in this valley.

Inter with an escaped South African prisoner of war whom I knew as "Bill" WILLIAMS, I walked to the top of the rise and from a position of observation saw an open truck driven from the direction of CIVITELLA enter the yard of a farm-house about 500 metres away from us. A crowd of men whom I took to be German soldiers jumped from the truck firing sub-machine guns towards the house. They were too far away from me to describe them but we could hear them shouting like madmen. They were there about fifteen minutes and I saw a fire start in the house. They were fixing all the time and as stray shots were passing over our heads we moved back to our hiding place. We afterwards heard trucks going towards CORNEA.

Shortly after 0900 hours we heard the sound of small arms automatic fire from the direction of CORNEA and I crept forward up the hill and although I could not see the village I saw dense clouds of smoke rising from its direction, which indicated to me that the village was on fire.

About 1100 hours everything went quiet but we did not move from the valley until the evening. We made our

/We made our

way to another valley where there was a hut which we had constructed for escaped British prisoners of war.

The next morning we moved back to our original hiding place.

On the 8th. July 1944, with my family, some civilians and three British prisoners of war, we decided to try and contact the British.

We succeeded in doing so on the 9th. July 1944, at CIGGIANO.

I have read over this statement. It is true and correct. I herewith append my signature.
