

I am an engineer and have lived here all my

owing to the Allies bumbing AREZZO I evacuated with my family to our villa at TEGOLETO on 15 December 43.

About 13 June 44, a German soldier came to the villa and told me that more of their men would be coming in about two days time. He said that they would stay in the wood opposite. He put a sign outside, pointing into my farmyard before leaving. This board had a letter N painted inside a circle with a figure 3 after it, like this :-

occupied six rooms in the villa and all the barns belonging to the farm. They came in ten or twelve Garman Army lorries and two Italian cars which were 1500 FIATS. These vehicles they parked in the wood nearby. Altogether there were about sixty men and these were under the command of an officer whom I took to be a lieutenent. When these soldiers arrived at first, theywere all dressed in grey-green type of uniform. This they changed however shortly after their arrival for a light khaki summer dress. I remember that on the grey-green uniform they all were a band around the waist upon which were inscribed the words "HERMAN GORRIES".

The officer I describe as :- about 35 years, 1 m. 75 cm. tall, thin build, grey eyes, fair hair, nearly bald. He was always dressed in a grey blue uniform.

I noticed in the days that followed all the vehicles which these Germans possessed bore the same sign as I have described above. The lorries had it painted somewhere on the back and the cars beside the rear left madguard. During the time that they were here a lot of these signboards were put in various places around the farms

Allied aircraft at this time, used to come very low over the distrect and I was afraid they might spot the Germans or their vehicles and burn the village. On account of this I left with my family on 25 June 44, and went to a farm about two hundred metres away:

On the evening of 29 June 44, I noticed all the lorries lined up outside the villa and gumesed that the Germans were leaving. I moved back into my house that evening and

/that evening and

saw in the farmyard about six dead geese. These geese had been brought in by the soldiers and all had been shot with some firearm.

The following days, whilst I was cleaning out the rooms that had been occupied by the soldiers I found a lot of pieces of paper. Then these pieces were put together I found that they were letters and bank cheques belonging to the people of CIVITELLA. These I later sent to Dr. CARDINALI, the Sindaco of BADIA al PINO. I also found a German envelope with a soldier's name "WILFRIED MATTHES" and field post number L51756 written on it. This envelope, now marked EXHIBIT "B" I have handed to Sgt. CLEMED of the British Special Investigation Branch on 30 March, 45. It could not have belonged to any other German soldier than one of them who stayed here between the 15th and 29th June44.

I have read over this statement. It is true and correct. I herewith append my signature.
